What does your next refrigerator look like? More importantly, what will it do?

WHAT WE AFFECTIONATELY refer to today as "the fridge," our

parents and grandparents called "the icebox." That's because what we use today literally started out in our ancestors' homes as a box of ice—often sunk underground—in which they stored perishable foods. Well, they tried to store perishable foods. Problem was, temperatures in such contraptions were hard to maintain, and the upshot was that the ice often perished pretty quickly (or was hard to get in the first place), and therefore, our great-grandparents ate a lot of spoiled foods.

The idea for something better was dreamed up in the 1700s but not put into anything like production until the late 1800s and early 1900s. Because these early models used

highly toxic chemicals such as ammonia and methyl chloride, there were some fatalities (which didn't do much for marketing, much less appetite). Then came the discovery of Freon, and the world of refrigeration was launched; by the end of World War II, our love affair with the fridge (and ice as something that came out of it instead of something we put in it) really began in earnest.

Who wouldn't want something as juicy as this incredible red beauty from Godrej?

COOLER ENERGY

Problem is, we discovered that Freon harms the atmosphere. While modern refrigerators usually use HFC-134a as a refrigerant, which does not deplete the ozone layer, the older refrigerators still populating our kitchens remain a cause for concern; see epa.gov/ozone/title6/608/disposal/household.html for more information on how to dispose of them safely.

We also discovered that the older the refrigerator, generally the more energy it consumes. Erik Zsiga, media relations manager for AB Electrolux, says that Electrolux's best refrigerators today consume 70 percent less energy than the standard refrigerator 15 years ago did. "We have reached this by making parts like isolation, compressors, and cooling systems more efficient," he says. "In the life cycle of a refrigerator, the use phase stands for more than three quarters of the CO2 footprint. The most important impact Electrolux can do to prevent climate change is to develop and sell energy-efficient appliances."



non-sticky, odorless gel morphs around products to create a separate pod that suspends items for easy access."

"There is a difference between free-standing and built-in refrigerators," says Zsiga. "For free-standing fridges, there is an opportunity to get away from rectangular sizes to more individualized shapes. For built-ins, we work with a pre-existing kitchen environment, where it's also up to furniture makers and other interior designs. Rectangular will probably remain the shape, in those cases. However, for both free-standing and built-in, we might use several small modules rather than one big one, [with] more adaptation to individual needs." Some look more like furniture, like Samsung's GRO. Others are a little wavy. Other prototypes use green gel and look like something straight out of The Jetsons—21st-century style.

BEYOND STAINLESS

Stainless is, without question, one of the most classy finishes we've seen on our refrigerators, and that's why it remains so popular.
